Secretary's Report

All told we had 106 entrants, a higher number than we've seen for some time. At the cut-off date we only had 81 registered which means that we had 25 late entries! 13 of those were our own members who should know better that a closing date for entries is for a very good reason – we need to organise catering etc. Another disappointment was the Friday 'Meet & Greet BBQ' We had 29 registered that they would be there and 53 actually showed up! Again, a high number of our own members were the culprits. Apparently they

All up we received 63 entries from our own club, 20 from Hunter Valley Norton Owners, 8 from other clubs and the rest who listed no club on their entry form. Small 2 stroke 50cc's get a second life after 35 years

Being a teenager during the 80's and 90's in my birth country has got to have been the best times of my life. From the age of 16 years old you were legally allowed to ride only up to a 50cc motorcycle on a learners license. This normally lasted for around 2 years where you either lost interest in bikes and got a car or purchased a bigger bike at the age of 18.

I moved to Australia from South Africa around 7 years ago and after feeling a bit nostalgic leaving behind fond memories of the 50cc 2 stroke days of racing your friends up and down the street, I decided look around Australia to see if there were any of these small smokers lying around. With no luck, I almost lost hope until around 3 years back when luck came my way, almost 30 years after owning my first 50cc.

Popping up on Facebook market place was a 1988 DT50LC, albeit a little rough! It was during Covid in period one was not allow to travel too far out of your areas so I bought it without seeing it and got it shipped up by a bike courier. Mechanically the bike was pretty good, cosmetically is was missing lights, levers, indicators, mirrors...and with limited spares available anywhere in the world I started to source from The Netherlands, Portugal and South Africa. I spent hours water papering and polishing plastics, metal polishing each spoke and cleaning up it to keep it as original as possible. I am so happy with the way it turned out and love it to bits. Sunday rides are a pleasure!













Two years later, a very similar situation, another 1988 model on Bikesales, this time in white. Without hesitation I jumped at it again without seeing it in person.

The condition was not as bad as my first find as he owner had started a restoration but lost interest. I got it shipped down from Queensland and got going to bring it to life. I have spent many hours cleaning & polishing it up the result is very pleasing.









The latest find has got to be one of the best finds to date (in the world). 100% original in every part with only 978 miles on the clock is my white and red 1988 DT50LC. My pride and joy! Very little needed attention on this beauty and purrs like a kitten.


