Peter Redman interviews George Burroughs

Q: Where were you born?

A: Bearpark, County Durham, England (north east England just below Newcastle).

Q: Did you have a nickname?

A: I was known as "Geordie" to my Army mates.

Q: What did you do in the Army?

A: I joined the British Army just before my 16th birthday and served for 25 years with the Royal Engineers. Detachments included Germany, Northern Ireland, Canada, Nepal, Hong Kong and Oman. I was also seconded to the Royal Brunei Armed Forces for three years.

In 1987 I was sent to the small volcanic island of Tanna in Vanuatu as part of a five-man team from the British Army to rebuild bridges and roads following the devastation caused by *Cyclone Uma*. It was the most



satisfying 4 months of my military career, constructing concrete abutments and bridges with local labour.

Comment: George is supported in life and his club activities by his wife, Helga.

Q: When did you start riding?

A: I started riding motorcycles when I was 16 years of age, (too young to get a motorcycle licence) and am still a keen rider (with a valid licence).

Q: What was your first motorcycle?

A: Triumph Tiger Cub 200 cc.

Q: What motorcycles have you owned?

A: I currently own a 1972 Triumph Tiger and a 650cc Yamaha Virago. Other bikes I've owned are Honda Dream 250cc, a Suzuki V Strom and a Yamaha Diversion.

Q: What is your favourite motorcycle?

A: No doubt about it - a 650cc Triumph Bonnie... but with electric ignition!

Q: When did you join the CCCMCC?

A: 2011.



Q: What positions have you held in CCCMCC?

A: I was the Club Treasurer from 2016-2020.

Comment: George carried out his position of Treasurer methodically and professionally and was awarded the 2020 Club Member of the year for his tireless work for the club.

Q: What other Interests/hobbies do you have?

A: Rugby Union, Viking Mythology and watching 'Heartbeat' and the Isle of Man TT.


Q: Do you have any other comments?
